The RECOGNITION Program

The Recognition program is the result of a close collaboration between the Conseil des arts et des lettres du Québec (CALQ) and the Indigenous arts community. Drawing on the values of dialogue, listening, and respect, the program took shape following consultations with a broad range of practitioners from the First Nations and Inuit artistic and cultural communities, who enriched the process with their experience and knowledge of the issues facing Indigenous artists, writers, and organizations.

Open, inclusive, flexible and tailored to Indigenous cultures' needs and realities, as well as to their specific ways of creating and disseminating artworks, this program is designed to support the Indigenous artistic community's reappropriation, reconstruction and development efforts. To that end, it seeks to:

Contribute to the knowledge, recognition, and promotion of Indigenous artists and arts.

Foster the reappropriation, transmission, and development of traditional Indigenous knowledge, languages, and arts.

Facilitate the early career and professional development of Indigenous artists by supporting the first professional experiences and providing guidance.

Encourage the respect of Indigenous protocols.





You are Inuit or a member of the First Nations

of Canada.

- You are a Canadian citizen and have lived in Québec for the past 12 months.
- Your commitment to your artistic practice is ongoing, whether that practice is traditional, customary, contemporary, or moving between these forms.
- You have participated in, produced, or distributed a work outside your training, in a context recognized by your peers, by Elders, or by your community.



Indigenous **artists** can apply for financial aid in **3 components** of the program:

Revitalization, Creation, and Transmission

- > Supports Indigenous artists in their practices throughout their careers.
- Supports the distribution, circulation, and promotion of Indigenous works and artists within and outside Québec.

Examples of activities that may be supported: research, collection, documentation, transmission artistic activities, first works, creation, professional development, professionalization, internships, mentoring, travel, residencies, exchanges, first professional experiences, circulation, promotion, etc.

Microgrant

- ➤ Facilitates the early careers and professional development of Indigenous artists by supporting initial professional experiences and offering guidance.
- Supports Indigenous artists in their practices throughout their careers.
- Supports the distribution, circulation, and promotion of Indigenous works and artists within and outside Ouébec.
- > Offers a simplified submission process and shorter response time.
- > Ideal for emerging Indigenous artists.

Examples of activities that may be supported: transmission, professional development, internships, first professional experiences, travel, circulation of works, rental or purchase of specialized equipment, promotion, creation, research, etc.

Impetus

Provides momentum to the career of Indigenous artists by offering them a first grant.

The candidacy must be presented by a third party who produces the application: it may be submitted by another artist, a cultural worker, by someone in the candidate's circle, or by members of their community.

There is a **deadline** for submitting the application. Please consult the program at calq.gouv.qc.ca/recognition.

Applications are evaluated by a jury that meets once a year and that includes artists, Elders, or experienced, recognized cultural managers.



Organizations,

this program is for you if

- You are a legally constituted non-profit corporation, with your head office in Québec.
- Your board of directors is composed mainly of Inuit and Indigenous people who are members of one of the First Nations of Canada, Canadian citizens, and normally reside in Québec.
- You offer services or engage in professional artistic activities.



Indigenous **organizations** may apply for financial aid in **two components** of the program:

Revitalization, Creation and Transmission

Supports projects by Indigenous arts organizations for the distribution, circulation, and promotion of Indigenous works and artists within and outside Québec.


Examples of activities that may be supported: creation, production, or reprise of works, shows, or events; promotion, circulation, recording, or distribution activities; hosting artists, apprentices in residence; transmission artistic activities: services to artists, etc.

Development of organizational capacities

Supports initiatives and the development and consolidation of Indigenous artistic organizations.

Examples of activities that may be supported: organizational consolidation, expanding and enhancing the workforce, audience development and loyalty activities, national and international development, search for financing, etc.





Good to know

The program is for both established and emerging artists.

A portion of the application may be presented in writing or orally (video recording).

Financial aid applications may be submitted at any time (except for the Impetus component, which has an annual application deadline).

Peer evaluation is the principle that guides the awarding of financial aid at the CALQ. Applications made as part of the Recognition program will be evaluated by a jury comprised mainly of recognized, Indigenous artists, professionals, and cultural managers, who are representative of the Indigenous artistic community.

The program can support customary, traditional, and contemporary forms.

The Conseil des arts et des lettres du Québec offers other programs for which Indigenous artists, writers, and organizations are eligible.

A grant can cover artist fees during the project, the purchase of equipment, renting a studio, a room, and equipment, application and internships fees, travel and living expenses (accommodations and per diems), promotion, realization, pre-production, production, or reprise expenses.
